## Library Stops Fees/Fines and Opens up on Sundays!



amount of late fees at the Phoenix Public Library, you will soon be able to breathe a sigh of relief. That is because those late fees are going away, for good! On September 11th, Phoenix City Council approved the library's "All Fines Forgiven" campaign, which will waive all current fines and late fees for overdue books, DVDs, and CDs at its 17 branches, and actually allows the libraries to stop charging late fees altogether.

However, that does not mean people will be able to check out items and keep them forever.

Under the new policy, which is set to start in November, rented books, DVDs, and CDs will still come with a due date. Instead of charging a fee each day for those items that are late, the library

For anyone who has racked up a serious will issue a reminder three days before an item is due, and then send out overdue notices when an item is three days, 10 days, and 28 days late. (Current late fees are \$0.10 and \$0.20 per day with maximums of \$5 to \$10, depending on the item.)

When an item is 51 days late, people will be given a bill with a "replacement fee." But, if you bring that item back to the library, even 50 days late, that replacement fee is waived.

The goal of the campaign, according to the library, is to get more people to sign up for a library card, to bring back people whose accounts were blocked due to unpaid fines, and to "remove barriers to accessing library materials."

In other good library news, our own library, Acacia Library (at 750 E. Townley Avenue) along with all other City of Phoenix Libraries will now have Sunday hours (1pm - 5pm) beginning September 22, 2019. These new and exciting changes will definitely make the library system more accessible to everyone!

## City of Phoenix Grants Help our Organization Shine

Curious how our ESSNA & BW has the funds to provide you this informative newsletter, run a website, advertise our mission/vision, host meetings, provide giveaways, post metal Block Watch signs, provide benches in the neighborhood and put on 'Slope Fest among other activities? The City of Phoenix

Police Department manages a Neighborhood Block Watch Grant Program that allows eligible groups (Block Watches and neighborhood organizations registered with Neighborhood Services) to apply for grants up to \$10,000. The application process is evaluated by the Oversight Committee and scored in order to determine whether the grant will be awarded in part or fully (or not at all!).

Your ESSNA & BW has successfully applied for and received just under \$10,000 for the past three grant cycles and we plan to continue applying in order to better serve our community! We are currently seeking suggestions for the next grant process

which begins in November. There are many items that are restricted or prohibited, so please check out <a href="www.phoenix.gov/police/neighborhood-resources/block-watch-grants">www.phoenix.gov/police/neighborhood-resources/block-watch-grants</a> for more information!

Did you know that ESSNA & BW is also a 501(c)3? That's right, we are a nonprofit! This means that we are tax exempt and we are considered a charitable/educational organization. ## What the Historical Fact?





Did you know Sunnyslope almost became it's own little town? After World War II, Sunnyslope began growing and attracting builders of middle-class houses. A business district developed including an A.J. Bayless grocery and movie theater along Dunlap, as well as more retail along Seventh Street. Soon after schools were built, including Sunnyslope High School in 1953. The settlement had citizens who began asking for it to incorporate as a town or city. On the other hand there were many residents that didn't want to pay more taxes for being a city, nor did they want Phoenix's more rigorous

building codes. Being under County jurisdiction was fine by them. At least three elections were held and each time the referendum to incorporate failed.

By the mid-1950s, Phoenix began a very aggressive annexation campaign. City leaders didn't want to see their tax base eroded, as was happening in cities back east. They were torn and unsure if they wanted to accept the costs of Sunnyslope, which was not connected to the city water or sewage system. There was also a lot of hostility of the incorporation referendums and they didn't look forward to a fight in the court or legislature, as happened with several annexations. Finally, in 1959 Phoenix annexed Sunnyslope as part of a much larger acquisition of land. Although the city has surrounded it and moved on, Sunnyslope retains much of its distinctive character, from views of the city to the distinctive five-point intersection at Dunlap-Seventh Street-Cave Creek Road.

## **Measuring Square Footage**



and/or the subsequent owner made additions.

Square footage is commonly used to determine if a home will fit a buyer's needs. The price per square foot can be used to compare the costs of different homes and even, determine the value of a property. The challenge is knowing the source of the square footage measurement and how it was taken.

County records use square footage to determine assessed value for property tax purposes. They are assumed to be reliable but there can be inaccuracies in their tax rolls. Another source of square footage could be from the house plans, but even that might not be accurate if the builder had to modify the plans

Appraisers are required to measure the home to determine square footage and they generally adhere to a standard method which leads to uniformity in the industry. The ANSI, American National Standards Institute, guidelines are considered the standard but there are no laws governing the process and so this can create accuracy issues. For example, because basements are below grade level, regardless of whether they are finished, they are typically not counted toward gross living area. Attics, because they are above grade level, can be included in gross living area. Even if the attic is unfinished and listed as the same standard as the rest of the home it would only have to meet the minimum height requirements of 7 feet.

Regarding detached properties; it is common to measure the perimeter of the house, including the living areas only. Porches, patios, and garages are typically not included. Gross living area includes stairways, hallways, closets with minimum height and bathrooms. Covered and/or enclosed porches would only be considered if they use the same heating system as the house. By contrast, condominiums generally measure the inside area of the unit and some appraisers may add six inches to account for wall thickness. If you were to compare the total of the interior room measurements of a detached home, it would be far less than the stated square footage using the standard method.

If in your research you find County records are significantly different from the appraisal or the plans; it becomes necessary to call in a professional appraiser to have the home measured. This will likely cost less than paying for a complete appraisal and will allow for an accurate measurement.

#### Arizona, 1 of 9 States Awarded Maternal Health Innovation Grant



The Arizona Department of Health Services has received a \$10.5 million grant from the Health Resources and Services Administration at the US Department of Health and Human Services, to enhance efforts to improve health outcomes for all women in Arizona.

"Losing even one mom to pregnancy-related complications is one too many," said Governor Doug Ducey. "With the addition of over \$10 million in available funds over the next five years, Arizona will be able to further its commitment to improving the health of Arizonas' moms and babies throughout the state."

Governor Ducey signed Senate Bill 1040 in April, establishing a 13 member Advisory Committee to provide recommendations for

enhancing data collection and reporting for the Arizona Maternal Mortality Review and requiring the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS) to release a report on maternal deaths in Arizona.

The Bill SB 1040 takes its name from Arianna Dodde; a healthy mother who tragically passed away after giving birth to her third child due to childbirth complications. Arianna was the daughter of ESSNABW Board Member, Vicente Garcia.

This Bill was all thanks to Vicente and his wife, Leticia Garcia, the March of Dimes, and Senator (& Sunnyslope resident) Kate Brophy-McGee. Their efforts to push Arianna's Law through the legislator and see it finally signed by the Governor served as the foundation for making Arizona competitive for this grant award.

This increased funding will facilitate improved access to care in communities that have limited or no access for pregnant and postpartum women throughout Arizona. The funding will also support systems of care through joining the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists' Alliance for Innovation in Maternal Health (AIM) Initiative and expand providers' participation in AIM throughout the state. Other activities will be implemented to reduce disparities in maternal health and increase pregnant and postpartum womens awareness of potential warning signs.

East Sunnyslope Neighborhood Association & Block Watch could not be happier to announce this huge victory for moms all over Arizona. This funding will address critical strategies to protect AZ's pregnant women and new mothers and it has been so exciting to see the legislative process work for our fellow citizens.

## Safety Tips for Your Pets on Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is a time for friends, family and holiday feasts—but also a time for possible distress for our animal companions. Pets won't be so thankful if they munch on undercooked turkey or a pet-unfriendly floral arrangement, or if they stumble upon an unattended alcoholic drink..

Check out the following tips for a fulfilling Thanksgiving that your pets can enjoy, too:

- **Turkey:** If you decide to feed your pet a small bite of turkey, make sure it's boneless and well-cooked. Don't offer her raw or undercooked turkey, which may contain salmonella bacteria. Do not give your pet the left over carcass—the bones can be problematic for the digestive tract.
- **No Bread Dough:** Don't spoil your pet's holiday by giving him access to raw yeast bread dough. When a dog or cat ingests raw bread dough, the yeast continues to convert the sugars in the dough to carbon dioxide gas and alcohol. This can result in bloated, drunken pets, which could become a life-threatening emergency requiring hospitalization.
- **Don't Let Them Eat Cake:** If you plan to bake Thanksgiving desserts, be sure your pets keep their noses out of the batter, especially if it includes raw eggs—they could contain salmonella bacteria that may lead to food poisoning.
- A Feast Fit for a King: While your family enjoys a special meal, give your cat and dog a small feast of their own. Offer them made-for-pets chew bones. Or stuff their usual dinner—perhaps with a few added tidbits of turkey, vegetables (try sweet potato or green beans) and dribbles of gravy—inside a food puzzle toy. They'll be happily occupied for awhile, working hard to extract their dinner from the toy.

A few small boneless pieces of cooked turkey, a taste of mashed potato, or even a lick of pumpkin pie shouldn't pose a problem. However, don't allow your pets to overindulge, as they could wind up with a case of upset stomach, diarrhea or even worse—an inflammatory condition of the pancreas known as pancreatitis. In fact, it's best to keep pets on their regular diets during the holidays. If your pet does get a hold of something they shouldn't eat, you can contact the **ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center** for advice. **Phone Number:** (888) 426-4435

National Cyber Security Awareness Month (NCSAM) is an annual designation observed in October and was first observed by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security and the National Cyber Security Alliance in 2003. Serious threats to personal data are at an all time high. Everyone, including individuals and businesses of all sizes, need to remain diligent in protecting themselves from hackers and privacy breaches. Scammers of all sorts bombard us through pop-ups, viruses, e-mails, phone calls and even the businesses we visit every day. Take these steps to protect yourself.

- Create secure passwords and don't share them.
- When creating passwords; avoid common words, phrases, and personal information.
- Keep your anti-virus, software and operating system up to date. Updates keep your computer as current as possible with the latest viruses and patches to protect your computer.
- Never give personal information over the phone or in email. Scammers love to call and claim to be someone they are not. Verify their authenticity by contacting the company directly.
- Don't click on links in e-mails. Links are an excellent way to get a virus. The same goes for pop-ups.
- Turn-on the pop-up blocker on your anti-virus. If you still receive a pop-up, do not click on it.
- Never visit unfamiliar websites and beware of look-a-like links. These links will have a similar spelling or will end in .NET versus .COM and will be an infected link attacking your computer.
- Laptop owners should install software to ensure the laptop can be tracked if stolen or remotely accessed to erase files or transfer files securely.
- When using social networks, use the privacy settings to protect your personal information.

As with e-mail, clicking unknown links within social networks places your devices at risk. This includes strange friend requests, messages, and even innocent looking videos. Small business owners are especially vulnerable. Hackers increasingly target Main Street and with often limited resources, tighter budgets and a smaller workforce, these employers require a different approach to cyber security.

Small Businesses can visit <u>www.sba.gov</u> for tips for tools and resources to help reduce cyber-incidents.

There has been a lot of discussions recently about what makes for the most secure password. You might be surprised to hear that simple tends to be safer than complex. You're more likely to forget a long, complicated password, and therefore more likely to write it down. Having to meet specific password requirements, or frequently change login information, has the same problem. The solution? Choose something easy to remember that is unique to you, but not something obvious like a pet's name or a favorite sports team. And you should never use the same password for multiple applications or websites.

NCSAM 2019 will emphasize personal accountability and stress the importance of taking proactive steps to enhance cybersecurity at home and in the workplace. This year's overarching message — Own IT. Secure IT. Protect IT. — will focus on key areas including citizen privacy, consumer devices, and e-commerce security. How does Homeland Security suggest you observe this month? Change your passwords, get virus protection, watch your emails, pay attention to the sites you visit, and use #CyberSecurityAwarenessMonth to post on social media.

We are starting a new level of neighborhood watch in which we increase our visibility to the people who wish to burglarize our homes, capitalize on crimes of opportunity, and hangout in our parks where our children play. Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol (PNP) is a partnership between the Phoenix Police and neighborhood groups like ours. We will be the extra eyes for the police and notify them when we see something suspicious.

Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol participants are citizens, not police officers or police department volunteers. They have no powers of arrest beyond that of any private citizen. They are trained for observation purposes only and participate for the benefit of their neighborhood.

- Possess a valid Driver's License or AZ ID Card
- Complete mandatory PNP training
