# **City of Phoenix: Emergency Rental Assistance Program**



Having Trouble Paying Rent/Utilities? The City of Phoenix was allocated \$51.1 million to begin the Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA) Program which began on March 8, 2021. The program is being administered through the City's Human Services Department and Wildfire, a local non-profit. This program is available to households regardless of citizenship or immigration status and Social Security Number. This assistance is to be used for rental payments and utility bills incurred between March 13, 2020 and December 31, 2021.

## What is the eligibility criteria?

- Must be a Phoenix resident
- Income at or below 80% of Area Median Income ERA funds will only be available through December or \$63,200 for a family of 4
- Qualified for unemployment benefits or experienced a reduction in income or experiencing

other financial hardship due to COVID-19

- Demonstrating risk of homelessness or house • instability
- Assistance for rent and utility

## What can these funds pay for?

- Rent, including late fees
- Utility bills, this includes electric and gas
- City Services bills, this includes water and trash

### What are the payment amounts?

- Rental Arrears up to 12 months of assistance • (residents in subsidized housing must have a rental obligation to qualify for rental assistance)
- Forward Rent residents may qualify for up to 3 • months forward rent once past due or arrears are paid in full, and if the household is unstable
- Utility Bills (electric and gas) arrears and credits
- City Services Bill (water) arrears and credits

#### I am a landlord; can I apply for tenants behind on rent?

Yes, landlords may apply with the tenant's permission

# Don't be Fooled by the Newest Utility Scam!



As temperatures continue to heat up and utility bills increase, scammers impersonating utility companies will use phone calls, text messages, emails, and in-person visits to demand payment for "overdue" bills." Falling for this type of scam could cost you hundreds of dol-

lars, put your personal and financial information at risk, and require time and effort to be sorted out.

Families aren't the only ones at risk. Small businesses and companies are also targeted with employees cial information.

month, 246 commercial and residential customers reported a utility scam totaling a loss of \$3,000, with one customer making a \$350 payment to scammers. The best way to protect yourself from utility scams is to learn about them! Remember these warning signs and preven-

tion tips to avoid becoming a victim.

#### Warning Signs

 Scammers will create a sense of urgency by threatening to turn off your electricity, water, or gas unless a payment is made immediately. It's difficult to think clearly when you're caught off guard but take your time and ask questions. Actual utility companies will send you various notices in the mail before your service is disconnected.

 Scammers will ask for payment through Zelle, Venmo, PayPal, a prepaid credit card, gift card, or even Bitcoin. Utility companies do not use these payment methods as they are not secure and challenging to record.

• Be wary of anyone claiming to be from a utility company asking to "inspect" your home; they may be scoping out your place for other criminal activities.



There are other types of utility scams and tactics you should also pay attention to, including: • Getting an offer to have a portion of your utility bill paid. This is most likely a bad check scam, where you will be given a bad check to deposit and then asked to send part of the money back. Then the check never clears, and you lose the money you sent back.

• Phone calls claiming you overpaid your utility bill. A scammer will ask you for financial information to provide a refund, but an actual company representative will not call asking for personal or finan-

wanting to resolve the issue as fast as possible. Last • Text messages or emails from an unknown source

with a link to view an online bill or 'make a payment'. Never click on a link from an unknown source. It could contain malware.

• An in-person visit during an outage offering you an express service restoration. This doesn't exist, and company representatives do not take payments in person.

• A phone call or home visit promoting affordable solar energy or energy-saving programs claiming to be sponsored by a utility company and asking for a deposit.

When in doubt about the legitimacy of something, it's best to hang up the phone, delete the email or text message, or shut the door until you can verify the information directly with a utility company. If you feel you've been the target of a scam, contact your local law enforcement, the Arizona Attorney General's Office, or the Federal Trade Commission. Even if you don't lose money, it's essential to report scams as they happen to help prevent others from falling victim. When scams are reported to the FTC, they are shared with more than 3,000 law enforcement agencies helping them hold scammers accountable.

# Acacia Library: Kids Cafe

Kids Café provides free meals for youth under age 18, Monday through Friday after school at several valley libraries. This includes the Acacia Library, right here in Sunnyslope!

Meals are grab and go and parents/caregivers do not need to bring children to receive meals, however they will be asked to provide proof of children and list each child's name and age. Each qualifying child will receive meals while daily supplies last.

On Fridays, customers may request double meals for each child if supplies allow to provide a little extra for the weekends. Meals are provided by St. Mary's Food Bank Alliance. Saturday meals are also available at Burton Barr Central Library located at 1221 N Central Ave. in downtown Phoenix. Acacia Library is located at 750 E Townley Ave.

# A Message from Your DHP Resource Lieutenant

I wanted to take a minute and thank all the neighborhood groups for your continued support, it really is noticed and appreciated by our officers. The Desert Horizon Precinct Resource Teams continue to proactively address criminal activity in your neighborhoods.

Your Bike, Neighborhood Enforcement Team (NET), and Community Action Officer squads (CAO) made 67 felony arrests, 73 misdemeanor arrests, while serving 14 search warrants during the month of August. We recovered 27 weapons to include assault rifles and handguns, as well as, 18 drug sale cases were generated. Officers seized over 2 pounds of metham-

phetamine and over 6,200 M30 Fentanyl pills.

The Bike Squad and CAO's continue to work on quality-of-life type issues in the community. These Officers partner daily with City resources such as Phoenix Cares, Streets Department, Graffiti Busters, and Park Rangers; to keep our neighborhoods clean and safe.
