I would like to give everyone an update on the Desert Horizon Precinct Resource Team's efforts in your neighborhoods since January 1, 2021. These results only include work done by Desert Horizon Pre-

cinct Neighborhood Enforcement Team (DHP NET), the BIKE Squad, and our Community Action Officers (CAO).

We are taking a holistic approach to crime suppression by not only focusing on violent and drug related crimes but also concentrating efforts on quality-of-life type crimes, which often plague residents and community stakeholders. This type of success is only possible when we have NET, BIKE, and CAO squads all working together to reach our goals; which is to make your communities safer and improve the quality of life for all.

Founded in 1964, UMOM is located in Phoenix, Arizona, and is an innovative provider of shelter, housing, and services for people experiencing homelessness.

Every night, UMOM provides safe shelter and supportive services for nearly 800 individuals experiencing homelessness – 155 families, 130 single women, and over 60 youth individuals. They also offer over 500 units of affordable housing across the Valley, each with special Program Centers for residents.

This is ESSNABW's 3rd year participating in UMOM's annual fundraiser and as usual it was a blast! Our groups picture made their "Thank You" card which was used to thank all of the UMOM volunteers. With our help, along with many others, UMOM earn 73% of their goal and although we had hoped for more of a turnout, we couldn't

be prouder of our contribution. Stay tuned for next year's event as we will definitely be volunteering again.



The Phoenix Police Department now has a mobile app, bringing a variety of resources and information to one place! Users can use the app to access online reporting, crime statistics, precinct locations, phone numbers, career opportunities, virtual Block Watch, victims' rights information, and much

Users can also turn on notifications from the precinct they live in to receive news updates and information on events going on in their area (ESSBW is in the 62 Precinct). The app is free of charge and available via the App Store or Google Play.

Alliance for Innovation on Maternal Health, Now a Reality



In January 2019, SB 1040, aka 'Arianna's Bill', was created for establishing an advisory committee on maternal fatalities and morbidity. The

final bill was introduced in June that year and signed by Governor Ducey. This bill was a labor of love, and loss, for Vicente & Leticia Garcia, ESSNA&BW Captains of East El Camino Drive.

Vicente's daughter, Arianna Dodde, gave birth to a healthy baby boy August 2018. This was her third child. Three days later, the 23-year-old was released from the hospital but had to be readmitted due to an undiagnosed torn uterus that had caused internal bleeding. She went into cardiac arrest and died. "Ariana was completely healthy," her father, Vicente Garcia, said. "The whole family, friends, all of us were 100 percent confident that she was going to go into this and deliver a healthy baby boy."

Thanks to their connection with our Neighborhood Association and our close relationship with Kate Brophy McGee (former State Senator), they were able to have a voice in the legislative process. Brophy McGee enlisted the help of the March of Dimes and within only a year 'Arianna's Bill' came to be.

In Sept. 2019, AZ was 1 of 9 states awarded the Maternal Health Innovation Federal Grant of 2.1 million dollars. This committee has met and reported its findings along with establishing AIM; the 'Alliance for Innovation on Maternal Health', which has joined with a national movement to standardize maternal care. Thirty Arizona hospitals have joined this movement, which is exceptional news for future mothers and their families.

"We are thrilled this is finally moving forward and grateful that the news outlets are creating public awareness", said Leticia Garcia, "I would hate for another family to be blindsided by this and it's comforting to know that Arianna's tragic death will help others in the future."

Update from Our Treasurer, Chelsey Weaver



ESSNA & BW has been busy utilizing Block Watch Grant Funds to improve the East Sunnyslope community in so many ways. This grant cycle we used funds to print quar-

terly newsletters for our community, share information about safety and crime prevention, as well as updates

about important issues and events. In addition, we have needed to replace our very much loved and worn-out pop-up tents, which have been used for everything over the years!

Last fall/winter during cooler weather, we purchased plants to attract butterflies, especially Monarchs. And because we focused on them, you can now check out the registered 10th Street Monarch Butterfly Way Station while walking the 10th Street Path. We also have t-shirts available to captains and members of our organization to help create a sense of unity and team building. Some of our most recent purchases were reus-

able bags with our logo and a safety message, plus street sign toppers to help create pride in the neighborhood!

Some of the less glamorous ways that these funds have been used are for website maintenance, table & chair rentals for events related to crime prevention, meeting space rental, and social media promotion. Unfortunately,

we are not immune to the same local crimes as everyone else. We had a burglary which cost us our television monitor used for meetings. The Block Watch Board graciously approved our reallocation of funds, and we were able to replace it.

Do not forget that this grant is used to help our community, and that includes you as a resident! If you have any ideas (within the confines of grant purchasing), that can help promote the goals of crime prevention, safety, community pride, and beautification, then we want to

hear from you!

Sunnyslope Revitalization Coalition + Habitat for Humanity Central Arizona Chapter partnership project in West Sunnyslope



What makes a great community? It's a place called "home", wherein the people feel safe, have a great quality of life, and prosper creating experiences and memories for peo-

ple of all ages. It's the people that share and care for one another that create those great community experiences. Our Sunnyslope neighborhood is one such great community.

Sunnyslope is known to be a special place as it has heart, along with the spirit of sharing and caring. We are excited about this incredible, once in a life time opportunity, to work together with Habitat for Humanity Central Arizona Chapter to build on the spirit of this great place we call HOME. Several pockets in our Sunnyslope Neighborhoods lack the infrastructure and resources to create a better quality of life. In an effort to regain that spark in a couple of areas of our community, we have formed what is called the Sunnyslope Revitalization Coalition. This Coalition is a collaboration of residents, non-profits, and businesses that are committed to the long term betterment of our Sunnyslope community.

Our first of many projects is focused on the revitalization of the West Sunnyslope Neighborhood. Habitat's preliminary windshield survey indicated the following needs:

- 168 homes needed window replacements.
- 188 homes needed landscape improvements.
- 198 homes needed façade improvements with paint.
- 139 homes needed roof repairs.



An estimate to complete all these revitalization projects would require well over \$2 million. Sunnyslope Coalition partnering with Habitat for Humanity Central Arizona has embarked on a journey of improving between 15 -20 homes. Each home improvement project could cost anywhere between \$10-\$15,000. Every home owner within the West Sunnyslope targeted area is eligible to apply for this home improvement and community pride

building program. The only ask in return is that the eligible home owner and his or her family put in their sweat equity towards their home improvement project. Our goal is to fundraise \$200,000 towards the end of the year. We have already raised \$30,000 with donations from Councilwoman Stark, Honor Health, and several local Sunnyslope businesses and well wishers. We have quite a bit to go!

The Sunnyslope Coalition believes that the first 15-20 home improvements will set the tone to rebuild the entire area. We are seeking YOUR help! There are several ways in which you could be a part of this amazing story. You can contribute through the State of Arizona's Tax Credit program. Did you know that you can specify that your tax dollars (\$400 individual, \$800 couple) could go towards a specific program such as Habitat for Humanity in your Neighborhood? You could also just donate or provide in-kind donations, or better yet, simply sign-up to volunteer. JOIN this MOVEMENT! Together we will BUILD our SUNNYSLOPE COMMUNITY!

Dog Poop, Not Just a Pet Peeve

What's Bugging You?



Picking up and properly disposing of your City of Phoenix pet's poop is not only a courtesy for others living in your neighborhood, but it is also

the healthy and environmentally sound thing to do. When it rains, pet waste on the ground can be

and washes with extra nitrogen; causing excess weed and algae growth.

You can help! Remember to bring bags with you when you walk your dog. Many parks and walkways also have pet bag stations. After picking up your dog's poop in the bag, tie the bag closed, and put it in a trash receptacle. Don't leave the bag for someone else to dispose.

Picking up after your pet at home is also important to maintaining water quality. Irrigation water or rain draining from your yard can also carry pet waste with it. You may think that the waste from only one dog does not make a difference to water quality, but an average dog can produce about a half a pound of poop per day.

Maricopa County alone has nearly 300,000 licensed dogs! National studies and surveys have found that 40% of Americans do not pick up their pet's feces. That adds up to a lot of pet waste being transported to our rivers, washes, and retention basins. Keeping your yard free of accumulated pet waste is not only sanitary, it is also required in Chapter 8 of the Phoenix City Code. When walking your hound, scoop poop from the ground!

It's a beautiful summer evening, and you decide to fire up the grill. With a cold drink in hand, you are just about to flip those sizzling burgers when that all too familiar buzz blows past your face. Flies! Ugh! It might seem that insects choose to annoy us over the summer but the real reason for their population boom is a complex interaction of winter rainfall, availability of food sources, and increasing temperatures. Insects are ectothermic, or "cold-blooded", meaning their body temperature depends on the external environment. So, in the summer, an increase in temperature typically correlates with an increase in insect activity.

Despite the nuisance that flies are, they are an especially important part of our ecosystem. Flies act as scavengers consuming rotting organic matter so we don't have to deal with it. Flies also turn poop and rotting carcasses into stock feed, and live bird, frog and lizard food; for free! All this being said, these little terrors can turn a fun afternoon in the sun into a swat-fest that have most of us heading back indoors.

There is a way to deal with flies without chemicals or chasing them around with a fly swatter. In fact, there are several plants you can put around your garden or yard that will help move them along for someone else to deal with!



Both fresh and dried, the scent given off by basil, deters flies. Since this is a plant that thrives in patio pots, adding some to your

summer flower arrangements or just sprinkling some on your backyard food tables, will help keep these tinywinged beasts from ruining your appetite.



For centuries, the glossy bay leaves from the bay laurel have been used as an aromatic in cooking and placed within cupboards to keep insects, weevils, and mice away. Its pungent scent is useful when both fresh and dried, and can be bun-

dled to hang near home entryways or around your BBQ or party.



One of the more attractive options, lavender, thrives in well-drained pots and sunny climates. Both the foliage and blooms are Ifragrant and fend off many types of insects,

flies included. Harvesting of the flowers for drying results in bundled, rich smelling sachets that you can place indoors or out!

Whatever you decide to use to deal with these cookout invaders, many times a combination of techniques to repel flies is your best defense. Good luck out there and don't forget to save me a burger and a cold one!


